SUMMARY OF RESEARCH

I take a multi-faceted approach to study how human cognition and the social world shape the world’s languages. My approach is largely experimental: I use rigorously designed **laboratory experiments**, often paired with **corpus analyses**. Much of my experimental work uses the **artificial language learning** paradigm (ALL) and I am part of a European network of scientists testing the limits and subtleties of this task. I am particularly interested in how biases in learning constrain variation and affect language change. I have experience implementing ALL tasks in **diverse linguistic populations** (including in highly multilingual populations and populations speaking understudied languages) in the lab, in the field, and online, testing both perception and production, and across different domains of language. I have also used tasks like the **Matched Guise Technique** to study socially meaningful linguistic variation, specifically looking at variable *liaison* in spoken French, and I am keenly interested in developing the integration of knowledge from the **social sciences** into research on language variation.
